The title of our meeting was "Promoting our Mission".

Our activities started at 7 in the morning and ended at 9:30 at night; hard work during the seven days we spent together. We have made the most of the time available to us. The conclusions of the III Congress express the great wealth that the Claretian Family possesses in our vocation to spread the message of the Gospel through the ministry of education.

The lectures, workshops, shared experiences and work in continental groups have allowed us first to inform ourselves and then to form ourselves in the rich heritage of the three congregations. PRESENTATION

From September 29 to October 5, 2014, the III Congress of Claretian Educators was held in Bangalore, India. It was the third time that the Claretian Missionaries, the Claretian Missionaries and the Missionaries of the Claretian Institution met, on a worldwide basis, on the occasion of our evangelizing commitment in the Catholic School. This time we were one hundred people from 20 different countries. On the occasion of this event and with content based primarily on the theme of education, we wanted to focus the 2015 edition of this annual magazine "The Claretian Mission."

The First Congress of Claretian Educators was held in Santo Domingo (2002), Dominican Republic. Perhaps the most important thing for those of us who participated in that meeting in Santo Domingo was to discover that the Claretian presence in schools necessarily implied, as in all the other areas in which we work, a clear evangelizing action. They were times when in most of Asia and Africa, they began with the work in schools.



The Second Congress (Vic 2008) already had a feeling of continuity. It was a meeting marked by Father Claret and the celebration of the bicentennial of his birth; This was the reason why Vic was elected. The Second Congress constituted a new step forward with regard to the awareness of the identity of the Claretian schools. There we emphasized that we had to be evangelizers with the seal of Claret.

The Third Congress of Claretian Educators, Bangalore 2014, was titled "*Promoting our Mission*". *Support teams and charismatic animation*. The general title of the meeting clearly focuses on the framework and the rationale for both the Claretian schools and the meeting: "we are missionaries". But, just by looking at the places where we came from, we could realize that the way of announcing the "Evangelii Gaudium" has to be different in each place. It is not the same to propose our evangelizing Mission in a school with the majority of committed Catholic students, parents and teachers than to do it in a place with a high or majority percentage of non-believers, of believers of other Christian confessions or of other religions such as Hinduism , Shinto, Islamism or

Buddhism. The central objective must be the same, the proclamation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ; but the more concrete objectives, the plans and, above all, the forms, manners and processes must be different.

A question opens up before us, can we find some lines common to all the places where we have schools that identify our educational work as Claretian schools?

We assume that the answer to this question is yes. It would be absurd to address this issue of the creation of teams that support the animation or management of our centers and the directing lines of those that make us up, if we do not assume that we can find the keys that guide our work as Claretian schools.

Centering the title of the III Congress on the support teams, the management and the animation of the charismatic traits, responds to a need perceived in practically all the geographical areas of our congregations. The laity and religious who carry out the educational work in each school, feel the need for support and guidance in order to make it possible for the "Claretian style" of organizing, educating and bringing the "joy of the Gospel" to reach the students. and family.

There is no lack of desire to make our schools truly Claretian centers, the biggest problem is knowing how this can be done in a concrete and real way. The complexity of the educational work in each school requires external support so that the Management of the school is a management of resources of people and material goods, typical of missionary institutions.

Of the importance that "regulated" education has in the three congregations, the statistics presented at the III Congress give a good account of it. Two comments must be made about these figures: the data for Africa are not included and around 80% of the total corresponds to the Claretian Missionaries. The total number of students is 108,312, of them 47,476 in Asia, 35,820 in America and 25,016 in Europe. The number of teachers is 6,000, of them 2,640 in America, 1,700 in Europe and 1,660 in Asia. The total number of Claretians and Claretians involved in education is 217, of them 120 in Asia, 50 in Europe and 47 in America.

Now, not all the educational processes that the Congregation supports are included within these "regulated" forms. Those that are carried out without being directly regulated by the systems are also living reality. But what gives meaning to both forms is their orientation towards the values that UNESCO defined as "Educate for Vidä.

When narrating these experiences we ask ourselves: What are the human and Christian values that we want to transmit? How are we doing it? What do we want to awaken in the recipients of our



Actions? What are the properly Christian values and the forms of transmission that we incorporate into our formative processes?

Sharing these experiences will surely make us more aware of the importance of our educational mission.
